Thank you for sending Workforce2030's policy recommendations. We appreciate the opportunity to speak on these important issues related to the building sector and preparing the workforce needed for a low-carbon economy in Ontario. I am happy to provide you with a response on behalf of Mike Schreiner and the Ontario Greens.

WORKFORCE NEEDED FOR HIGH-PERFORMING BUILDINGS

Ontario Greens are committed to giving 60,000 young people, over the next 4 years, the skills and experience to work in the green economy through a year of free college tuition plus a year of guaranteed work when they graduate with targeted recruitment of women, Indigenous people, and racialized communities.

Ontario Greens will also:

- Create hundreds of thousands of new jobs by retrofitting 40% of existing homes and workplaces to net zero by 2030, and 100% by 2040.
- Modernise the apprenticeship application process to provide candidates with an electronic, single-entry access to the apprenticeship application and registration process.
- Guarantee one year of paid, on-the-job apprenticeships through a Climate Youth Corps and groups like Hammer Head.
- Reduce the ratio of journeypersons to apprentices to one-to-one.
- Increase training opportunities by providing incentives for businesses that participate in training and certification programs in job growth areas such as green building, biomedical technology, renewable energy, and sustainable transportation.
- Provide incentives for businesses involved with green retrofits, reforestation, and other forms of green economic activity to provide Ontario youth with valuable job experience.

Dear Workforce 2030 Coalition,

Thank you for writing regarding your coalition's priorities for advancing sustainable and economic growth of Ontario's building sector.

The Ontario Liberal Plan, <u>A Place to Grow</u>, outlines our ambitious plan for cutting Ontario's greenhouse gas emissions by 50% below 2005 levels by 2030. An essential component of that plan is building and retrofitting energy-efficient buildings, which relies on the workforce to achieve it. As you know, heating contributes about 20% of Ontario's total emissions – and most homes are not prepared for more frequent flooding.

We'll provide 100,000 easy to access grants of up to \$3,000 each year for people and businesses to make high-performance energy and climate-resiliency retrofits, including new windows, insulation, heat pumps and flood protection, in addition to providing interest-free loans for deeper retrofits. Families learn too late the terrible toll fires and floods can have. We'll work with municipalities, real estate and insurance leaders to inform people on how they can take action about energy efficiency and flooding or other climate risks for their homes and buildings. We'll also retrofit schools, hospitals, colleges, universities, social housing and other public sector buildings through a \$500 million annual investment to make them energy efficient and climate resilient.

We'll update the Ontario Building Code so all new buildings and renovations are built to tiered and leading energy-efficiency and climate resiliency standards starting in 2025. We'll also position Ontario's forestry sector to lead the way with low-carbon building materials, including making it easier to build tall wood and prefabricated buildings.

Choosing the right programs, schools and careers can be overwhelming. We'll help by launching an easy-to-use website for people to navigate Ontario's colleges, universities and training programs – including information on costs and post-graduation outcomes like jobs and potential earnings. We'll also expand universal access to free career counseling with targeted services for people in communities underrepresented in certain careers.

We'll help more people get on-the-job training by funding opportunities through the Canada-Ontario Job Grant and SkillsAdvance – and we'll create new targeted support for young people unable to find secure employment. We'll also approve new college, university and training programs more quickly and offer greater flexibility and support to adapt those programs to meet the evolving needs of the job market, including high-performance, low-carbon building. So colleges, universities and training schools don't have to rely solely on tuition increases to make these transformations, we'll create a \$1 billion fund and increase operating grants.

Short, highly-focused programs called microcredentials can also help teach new skills quickly. We'll build high-quality, career-focused microcredential programs in partnership with



employers and educators, and we'll enhance the external review of existing programs for quality, making sure outcomes are tracked and learners are protected.

Skilled trades jobs – like plumbers, electricians and construction workers – offer some of the most in-demand, stable and well-paying careers in Ontario. To get more people into the skilled trades – especially those underrepresented in the trades – we'll enhance the apprenticeship system, working with unions, employers and schools to promote these great opportunities and make it easier to participate in an apprenticeship. This includes expanding the Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program and reintroducing shop classes in more high schools, as well as funding union and employer-led training at more comparable levels to colleges. We'll also give \$2,000 to those who go into apprenticeship training by doubling the existing federal incentive grant.

The Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) helps students pay for college and university, but the Ford Conservatives cut the program's budget by more than half – forcing thousands of students to take on more debt or leave school. We'll reverse these damaging cuts, giving significantly more grants that students never have to pay back and ensuring no qualified student is prevented from pursuing higher learning due to a lack of resources. This will include waiving post-secondary application fees for students in need. We'll also keep tuition costs from rising and eliminate the interest rate so current and future student loans become easier to pay off. As well, we'll simplify OSAP and expand eligibility – making it the 'one window' people go to for help to learn at any stage of life by also integrating employment training supports.

Ontario can be a place to grow, if we make the right choices. We need to rebuild what's always made us strong. Education. Health care. Public services that support working families. They're all key to a better future and economic dignity for our families.

Thank you for your advocacy for a more sustainable Ontario. I look forward to working with you to build the workforce Ontario needs.

Thank you for your letter. Members of the ONDP Caucus will always be available to meet with the members of the Workforce 2030 Coalition to discuss ways to get to a net-zero future.

In 2021, the Ontario NDP released its *Green New Democratic Deal*, which we believe is the boldest, most effective — and achievable —climate plan Ontario's ever had. Our plan includes a world-leading building retrofit program that will add more than \$15.2 billion to our annual GDP and create about 100,000 good jobs. Thank you for your letter to the Ontario Progressive Conservative Campaign on behalf of the Workforce 2030 Coalition about supporting the development of a highly skilled workforce and green manufacturing that will fuel jobs of the future.

From day one, our government, under the leadership of Premier Ford, has been committed to working for Ontario's workers. We are proud of our record over the last four years providing workers with opportunities to learn new skills that will lead to better jobs and help workers realize their potential in exciting fields and if re-elected, we will continue to get it done for Ontario's workers to support better jobs and give bigger pay cheques.

In our most recent budget, *Ontario's Plan to Build*, we outlined our plan to invest in skills training, introduce first-in-Canada protections, and help businesses attract and retain the best and brightest.
