

FAQs originated as questions asked in response to the OAA's Construction Contract Administration Committee's "Ask a Question, Get an Answer" efforts, posed by callers to the Hotline, and sent by email to the Practice Advisors. The responses are based on the limited information contained in the question as posted and may include assumptions made about the context and circumstances in order to frame the response. The responses and answers were reviewed by committee members; they represent peer advice and are not to be taken as OAA policy.

The FAQs were current when they were written. With the advent of the 3rd edition of the Canadian Handbook of Practice (CHOP), several FAQs were revised to add references to the new document. In other cases, the answers may refer to the Construction Lien Act (CLA) as opposed to the newer Construction Act (CA). Since there are still projects underway under the CLA, such answers may not have been updated.

Readers are to use their judgement in applying the FAQ responses to the specifics of their own situations.



Templates Ready for Use With The New OAA Contract Suite 2021

With the launch of the rest of the OAA Contract Suite happening this month, members and clients will be able to access some new or updated documents to support the delivery of their projects. Users can expect the release of further support documents over the next couple of months.

The new OAA Standard Forms for Extra Services or Contract Change were created in response to membership queries received at the OAA's Hotline. Both legal counsel and Practice Resource Committee were consulted as part of the development of the new template, which provides a standardized and recognizable document that contains the updated verbiage of the OAA 600-2021 and OAA 800-2021 Contracts relating to extra services not considered in the original signing of the contract.

The revised OAA Standard Certificate of Payment and Distribution Forms provide a standard document which references the *Architects Act* and notes the professional

responsibility of the Architect or Licensed Technologist OAA. Developed with the assistance of legal counsel and Practice Resource Committee, the forms may be offered in lieu of a statutory declaration. These forms would apply to all invoices with the exception of the first.

Clients and members are advised to consult their own legal, accounting, or insurance representatives to obtain suitable professional advice in those regards.



With the launch of the new OAA Contract Suite, Practice Advisory Services has been updating a variety of resources, in particular the Practice Tips. Providing "best practices" guidance on issues affecting the daily practice of architecture, Practice Tips promote better understanding of the services OAA members offer and help clarify the expectations of those who work with them.
